The boundary of the solar system ends in a spherical cloud known as the Oort cloud. This is a hypothetical sphere composed of icy bodies that surround the solar system. It marks the limit of the Sun's gravitational influence. This predicted region is believed to be around 2,000 to 100,000 astronomical units (AU) from the Sun.
